

#### Loving God and keeping his commandments

"If you love me, you will keep my commandments." Love is at the heart of the covenant God has established with the people he chose for himself in order to perpetuate it to the whole of humanity. A covenant requires fidelity to the promises made by the two parties, done freely and out of love. The pinnacle of freedom is seen in the most selfless act of the person towards God and one's neighbour. "I will be your God, and you will be my people." This promise of God run throughout the fabric of the Sacred Scripture. Christ has fulfilled it on the cross. He has inaugurated the new covenant during the Last Supper and renewed again and again when we celebrate the Holy Eucharist. "This is my body... this is the chalice of my blood, the blood of the new and eternal covenant" (Eucharistic Prayer I-IV). "Do this in memory of me."

The commandments of God are expressions of his love that would lead us to the fullness of life. The temptation of the ancient serpent (Satan or the devil) to Adam and Eve was to put in their minds doubt on God's love for them and that he's arbitrary by not allowing them to eat the fruit of the tree of knowledge of good and evil. While they are already like god bearing his image and likeness, they gave in to the temptation to be like God without God (CCC 398). That's the greatest tragedy that has entered humanity. The rest of the story is a bit long to be told. God does not give up, however. His love is everlasting. The ten commandments he has given through Moses are again his most pure and authentic expressions of love that gives us life. Again and again, the Israelites were laid choices as they journey to the promised land. Blessings accompany with obeying the Lord's voice and observing his commandments. Curse follow on the contrary (see for example Deuteronomy 28).

The Catholic Church, our mother who teaches us, echoes this invitation throughout the generations. "God has loved us first. The love of the One God is recalled in the first of the 'ten words'. The commandments then make explicit the response of love that man is called to give God" (CCC 2083). We all certainly know our predicament. We are all wounded and we carry this even after our baptism. St Augustine calls this concupiscence, our tendency to sin. This is why God has to redeem us and save us from being eternally separated from him. He sent his only-begotten Son, the Second Person of the Trinity, a God-incarnate, taking on our flesh, he became like us except sin. Jesus willingly embrace the mission entrusted to him by the Father so that through his life, death and resurrection, we will all be led back to our eternal home- to God, the life of the Trinity. When he ascended into heaven, he did not leave us orphans. He sends us another helper, a Paraclete, an advocate- the Holy Spirit. The presence of the Holy Spirit has penetrated every sacrament that we have in the Catholic Church. He will help us to obey God's commandments and to love God, for He is the Spirit of Love that binds the Father and the Son. He is the fire of love that would enflame our hearts to hold on to the covenant God has made between us in Jesus Christ. Dear brothers and sister, let not our failures, our sins stop us to approach the throne of God's mercy and faithfulness. Let's continue our covenant journey by loving God and keeping his commandments.

#### **CATECHESIS**

Many people have a reluctance to pray the rosary because they think it detracts from Jesus, that we should just go straight to him. St. John Paul II responded to this by explaining that in praying the rosary we are taught about Christ from Mary:

Christ is the supreme Teacher, the revealer and the one revealed. It is not just a question of learning what he taught but of "learning him". In this regard could we have any better teacher than Mary? From the divine standpoint, the Spirit is the interior teacher who leads us to the full truth of Christ (cf. Jn 14:26; 15:26; 16:13). But among creatures no one knows Christ better than Mary; no one can introduce us to a profound knowledge of his mystery better than his Mother.

The first of the "signs" worked by Jesus – the changing of water into wine at the marriage in Cana – clearly presents Mary in the guise of a teacher, as she urges the servants to do what Jesus commands (cf. Jn 2:5). We can imagine that she would have done likewise for the disciples after Jesus' Ascension, when she joined them in awaiting the Holy Spirit and supported them in their first mission. Contemplating the scenes of the Rosary in union with Mary is a means of learning from her to "read" Christ, to discover his secrets and to understand his message.

This school of Mary is all the more effective if we consider that she teaches by obtaining for us in abundance the gifts of the Holy Spirit, even as she offers us the incomparable example of her own "pilgrimage of faith". (17) As we contemplate each mystery of her Son's life, she invites us to do as she did at the Annunciation: to ask humbly the questions which open us to the light, in order to end with the obedience of faith: "Behold I am the handmaid of the Lord; be it done to me according to your word" (Lk 1:38).

Further information will follow during the week about Adoration and confession. Until then, the churches will only be open for scheduled Masses.

We also wish to remind everyone that the bishop's dispensation from the Sunday obligation remains. So no one is obliged to attend Mass. Furthermore, if anyone is unwell we would ask them to take care of themselves and stay home.
