For some reason, some people think that the Holy Family is not a helpful, 'practical', or 'real' model for our families to emulate. They are too perfect, some say, or too far removed from our reality. But through all the things we have experienced this year, this surely seems false. All the unexpected trials, being locked out of our churches, uprooted through loss of jobs, seemingly besieged by a force bigger than us – all this is surely very similar to the same trials the Holy Family faced. They too had surprise after unpleasant surprise sprung on them; they were locked out of the inn, as we were locked out of our churches; they too would have had to deal with economic insecurity moving from Galilee to Bethlehem to Egypt and back again; they too were at the mercy of forces beyond them – the might of an empire and a powerful king. This year has surely made the Holy Family more 'real' to us than ever before.

That's why we should be unashamed at finding in the Holy Family not only a help in time of trial but a good example for us in our own situation. Surely we ourselves desire the calmness and courage of St. Joseph to lead our own families through such difficulties and uncertainties. Surely we desire the firmness of faith and hope that Our Lady displayed in responding to the promises made her by God. Surely we desire to grow through adversity in wisdom and in stature as Christ himself grew in wisdom and in stature. Each member of the Holy Family is not some far removed 'ideal', beyond our reach and therefore unhelpful. No! Each member of the Holy Family manifests to us all some virtue that we all can grow in, and all desire to grow in.

On this feast of the Holy Family, therefore, let us not misunderstand the Holy Family; for we risk losing a big help if we do. Let us instead meditate on their life and example, calling upon their intercession to help us and our families grow each day a little more like them, to make our families holy like theirs.

### GOSPEL: Lk 2:22-40

The child grew to maturity, and he was filled with wisdom. When the day came for them to be purified as laid down by the Law of Moses, the parents of Jesus took him up to Jerusalem to present him to the Lord – observing what stands written in the Law of the Lord: Every first-born male must be consecrated to the Lord – and also to offer in sacrifice, in accordance with what is said in the Law of the Lord, a pair of turtledoves or two young pigeons. Now in Jerusalem there was a man named Simeon. He was an upright and devout man; he looked forward to Israel's comforting and the Holy Spirit rested on him. It had been revealed to him by the Holy Spirit that he would not see death until he had set eyes on the Christ of the Lord. Prompted by the Spirit he came to the Temple; and when the parents brought in the child Jesus to do for him what the Law required, he took him into his arms and blessed God; and he said:

'Now, Master, you can let your servant go in peace, just as you promised; because my eyes have seen the salvation which you have prepared for all the nations to see, a light to enlighten the pagans and the glory of your people Israel.'

As the child's father and mother stood there wondering at the things that were being said about him, Simeon blessed them and said to Mary his mother, 'You see this child: he is destined for the fall and for the rising of many in Israel, destined to be a sign that is rejected – and a sword will pierce your own soul too – so that the secret thoughts of many may be laid bare.'

There was a prophetess also, Anna the daughter of Phanuel, of the tribe of Asher. She was well on in years. Her days of girlhood over, she had been married for seven years before becoming a widow. She was now eighty-four years old and never left the Temple, serving God night and day with fasting and prayer. She came by just at that moment and began to praise God; and she spoke of the child to all who looked forward to the deliverance of Jerusalem.

When they had done everything the Law of the Lord required, they went back to Galilee, to their own town of Nazareth. Meanwhile the child grew to maturity, and he was filled with wisdom; and God's favour was with him.

# Frankly Speaking...

#### **Catechism of the Catholic Church**

#### **FAMILY-** The Domestic Church

1655 Christ chose to be born and grow up in the bosom of the holy family of Joseph and Mary, the Church is nothing other than "the family of God." From the beginning, the core of the Church was often constituted by those who had become believers "together with all [their] household. When they were converted, they desired that "their whole household" should also be saved. These families who became believers were islands of Christian life in an unbelieving world.

1656 In our own time, in a world often alien and even hostile to faith, believing families are of primary importance as centres of living, radiant faith. For this reason the Second Vatican Council, using an ancient expression, calls the family the Ecclesia domestica. It is in the bosom of the family that parents are "by word and example . . . the first heralds of the faith with regard to their children. They should encourage them in the vocation which is proper to each child, fostering with special care any religious vocation."

1657 It is here that the father of the family, the mother, children, and all members of the family exercise the priesthood of the baptized in a privileged way "by the reception of the sacraments, prayer and thanksgiving, the witness of a holy life, and self-denial and active charity." Thus the home is the first school of Christian life and "a school for human enrichment." Here one learns endurance and the joy of work, fraternal love, generous - even repeated - forgiveness, and above all divine worship in prayer and the offering of one's life.

1658 We must also remember the great number of single persons who, because of the particular circumstances in which they have to live - often not of their choosing - are especially close to Jesus' heart and therefore deserve the special affection and active solicitude of the Church, especially of pastors. Many remain without a human family often due to conditions of poverty. Some live their situation in the spirit of the Beatitudes, serving God and neighbour in exemplary fashion. the doors of homes, the "domestic churches," and of the great family which is the Church must be open to all of them. "No one is without a family in this world: the Church is a home and family for everyone, especially those who 'labour and are heavy laden."
